She is leading the professional development of teachers as they move to a more student-centric orientation and develop strategies to facilitate creativity in the learning opportunities they offer their students.

She is a highly respected personal performance coach and advisor using her passion and experience as a successful public school teacher, university professor, and education consultant to inform her practice and that of those with whom she works. She is also the co-founder and program leader of the Distance Learning Masters Degree in Curriculum Studies with a focus on Music Education at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia.

New Composition Commissioned



OUR COMMISSION

December 6, 1917...A date that has become a sad part of our history in this great city of Halifax.

It was the day that the French cargo ship *SS Mont-Blanc*, carrying explosives from New York and destined for France, accidentally collided with the Norwegian ship, the *SS Imo*. The resulting explosion saw a large area of both Halifax and Dartmouth levelled. The pressure wave snapped trees, bent iron rails, demolished buildings, grounded vessels, and scattered fragments of the Mont-Blanc for kilometres. Almost 2000 innocent people were killed and almost 9000

others were injured.

The tragic explosion and the unfortunate events that followed for weeks afterward became known as The Halifax Explosion. A disaster recognized now as the largest man-made explosion prior to the development of nuclear weapons.

The Second Chances Community Band and the Halifax Community Band Festival have begun the process of commissioning an original work for concert band whose world premiere performance will take place at our 5th annual Halifax Community Band Festival in May of 2018. We very much hope you will be able to join us to



solemnly recognize the lives that were lost, the bravery of those who survived, and the kindness of those cities who came to our aid in the days that followed.



OUR COMPOSER - Biography

Bob (Robert) Buckley was born in Brighton, England – he now divides his time between Vancouver, Montreal and Holland. He has a diverse career as a composer, arranger, performer, producer, recording artist and conductor. He has conducted and arranged for major artists like Michael Bublé, Bryan Adams, Celine Dion, Our Lady Peace, Simple Plan and Aerosmith. In the film and television world, he has scored numerous award-winning shows for Disney, Alliance, ABC, FOX, CBS, PBS, CBC and the Cartoon Network. In the live stage world, he has composed

music for contemporary dance, musicals and large-scale worldwide television events including the Calgary Olympics, the Victoria Commonwealth Games, the Vancouver Olympics and the FIFA World Cup Opening Ceremony with Cirque Du Soleil. He composed *This Is My Home* for the Canadian Pavilion at the World Expo – a song that has been performed every Canada Day since and has become a Canadian tradition. In the concert world, he has composed and conducted for major symphony orchestras and his symphonic wind band compositions are being performed worldwide. Bob was invited to be composer-in-residence at Troy University in Alabama where a CD of his symphonic wind music was recorded called Continuum. Recently, he had the honour of recording a CD called Undercurrents with the renowned Naden Band of the Canadian Navy. His concert music is published by Hal Leonard.

Our Ensembles

Quality music education, at any level, depends a lot upon the individual who is teaching the students. Many musicians in Nova Scotia, whether amateur or professional, can point to specific individuals who helped guide them on their path to becoming life-long players. Ten years ago, the province of Nova Scotia lost two of its finest and most influential music educators and the two levels of performance groups at our festival are named in their memory.



The Ron MacKay "Music for Life" Beginner Band

Ron MacKay retired from the Armed Forces Band in 1966 and began a career in music education as an instrumental music teacher in Truro. As director of the Cobequid Educational Centre Symphonic Band and its feeder programs from grades 4 through 12 he developed one of the more prominent school bands in the Atlantic Provinces and in Canada. During his tenure as band director in Truro, over 300 students went on to pursue careers in music.

When he retired from teaching in 1991, Ron remained active as a clinician, adjudicator, conductor, and composer throughout Canada and the Atlantic Provinces. He held positions as conductor of the Saint Mary's University Concert Band, St. F.X. University Wind Ensemble, the Scotia Wind Ensemble, Dalhousie University Symphonic Wind Ensemble, the conductor of the Halifax Concert Band and the Scotia Brass Ensemble.

Ron spent much of his time arranging and composing music for young bands with over one hundred published works for band including 8 commissioned works.

The James H. Hargreaves Advanced Band

James H. Hargreaves was born in Perth, Scotland in 1934 and emigrated to Canada in 1959. He became prominent in the Canadian world of music as a virtuoso performer, renowned conductor and gifted teacher. Considered one of the foremost music directors of wind ensembles in Canada, he built programs that trained a generation of instrumental teachers.



In 1970, he attended Crane School of Music, State University of New York and was a full professor at the St. Francis Xavier University School of Music from 1970 until his retirement in 1999.

James Hargreaves was the founding Music Director and Conductor of the Nova Scotia Youth Wind Ensemble from 1991 to 1999, conductor of the National Youth Band of Canada in 1996, member of the Maritime Jazz Orchestra and an adjudicator and clinician across Canada.
